



I CAN be an advocate for animals.

SAFETY FOR YOU AND YOUR PET

1) The five basic commands your dog should know are: COME, DOWN, HEEL, SIT AND STAY.

- 2) Leave an animal alone when it is EATING OR CHEWING a toy.
- 3) Always ASK the pet's owner if it is OK for you to pet his dog.

4) Keep your pets away from house and garden plants. Some are very TOXIC OR POISONOUS.

- 5) Dogs like their own space; they are very TERRITORIAL.
- 6) Let a pet SNIFF your hand, shoes and clothes until it feels safe with you. Then pet the dog or cat under its CHIN.
- 7) Avoid EYE CONTACT with a strange dog.

8) Keep you pets away from dangerous foods like CHOCOLATE, GRAPES AND RAISINS.

- 9) Tell an ADULT if you get bitten by an animal.
- 10) Always keep your pet on a LEASH when you take it for a walk.
- 11) Never try to break up a DOGFIGHT.
- 12) If you see an animal that is hurt, NEGLECTED OR ABUSED, ask an adult you trust to call Moore County Animal Control.
- 13) If a strange dog comes up to you aggressively make like a TREE.
- 14) If the dog knocks you down, act like a LOG.
- 15) If you come upon a pack of dogs, throw A SMALL ITEM away from you to distract them and then walk very SLOWLY in the other direction.
- 16) If one German Shepherd bites someone, it doesn't mean that all German

Shepherds are bad dogs. Blame the DEED not the BREED.

17) What about cats? "Heads" wins over "Tails" every time, so always approach a cat from the FRONT, not from the BACK.

18) So that your pet can be returned to you if it gets lost, make sure it has an ID TAG on its collar and a MICROCHIP.



It supports affordable spay / neutereforts to reduce the intake of unwanted animals at animal control facilities, thus reducing the number of animals enthanized because there are no homes for them.

The Spay & Neuter Veterinary Clinic of the Sandhills provides spay/neuter/rabies at a reduced price for animal welfare groups and individuals who do not have and cannot afford a private veterinarian.

- Advocacy
 - What is an <u>advocate</u>?

- PET PESPONSIBIL
- An advocate is a person who <u>speaks</u> up for and <u>acts</u> for the benefit of someone else.
- Animals cannot "speak" for themselves. They need us to do that for them. They need us to be their <u>advocates</u>.
- The following brochure shows you many things you can do to show your concern and support for animals.
 - Read it carefully and think about what you can do. Check off the ways you can help.
- Save this brochure and keep it handy!

Help the shelters...

- Call the shelter or spay/neuter clinic and ask how you can help.
- Hold a drive to collect supplies such as blankets, animal carriers, food or toys for the animals. You could put a notice up at schools, churches and businesses in your area explaining that you are collecting for the animals.
- S Ask your family to adopt your next pet from the local shelter.

Spread the word about being an advocate for animals...

- Write a letter to the editor of your newspaper about an animal issue that's important to you.
- Create a play or picture show for younger children that teaches them kindness to animals.
- Make posters about being kind to animals and adopting them from shelters.

You can help by...

- Showing your siblings how to treat family pets.
- Discussing with your family how you can use your computer and phone to spread the word about adoptable pets.
- Making sure YOUR pets are cared for.
- Teaching family members what you learned in class.
- Encouraging them to have their pets spayed or neutered and to spend time with their pets.
- Encouraging them to take pets off tether/chain for a while to exercise them and give them companionship and love.
- Encouraging them to consider adopting a black or older dog or cat.
- Helping family members find homes for pets they can no longer keep.







Be part of the solution and have fun while making a difference!

If you see a pet that is not being cared for...

- ③ Do NOT go up to the pet yourself.
- Tell an adult.
- O Ask the adult to speak with the owner.
- Call Animal Services 910-947-2858.
- ☺ In an emergency, call 911.

<u>If you see someone</u> hurting an animal<u>...</u>

- O NOT go up to the person yourself.
- Take a good look at the animal & the person so you can describe them later.
- Notice the animal's color, any spots or stripes, does it have a collar?
- Notice the person big/small, young/old, color of shirt/pants.
- Sun to find an adult and ask them to call Animal Services at 910-947-2858 or the Police.

What you can do to help raise money...

Animal rescue groups and shelters always need money. The money you raise could be used for food, toys, beds and medical treatment for rescued animals. Be sure to let the people know the money goes to help the animals.

- Hold a garage or yard sale. To get items to sell, ask neighbors and friends to clean out their closets. Advertise your event, letting people know the time, place and date.
- Look for jobs you can do to raise money, such as raking leaves, washing windows, collecting cans or bottles for recycling, walking dogs or feeding pets.
- Sell something you've made. You could create homemade cards from recycled paper, have a lemonade stand, or prepare goodies for a bake sale.

- ACT QUICKLY
- Cocate a recent picture of your pet
- Call the Animal Center of Moore County 910-947-2858 and complete a LOST Pet Report
- Go online to www.thepilot.com, Select the Submit heading, Select the Lost Pet link under Online Services, Complete the report and be sure to upload the photo of your pet.

If you FIND a Pet..

- ACT QUICKLY
- Take a picture of the pet
- Call the Animal Center of Moore County 910-947-2858 and complete a FOUND Pet Report
- Go online to www.thepilot.com, Select the Submit heading, Select the Found Pet link under Online Services, Complete the report and be sure to upload the photo of the pet.


