trainers, for a Pet Responsibility Celebration Assembly.

First, the students impressed everyone in attendance with their knowledge about what it means to be a responsible pet owner and the im-

portance of spaying / neutering pets. During the lesson review, the students were reminded that in Lesson 5, " I CAN" Be An Advocate For Animals, they learned about being advocates for pets. All of the students began their advocacy journey with their art work and pet responsibility messages on 'Clinic Bags'. The Clinic Bags are used by the Sandhills Spay Neuter Veterinary Clinic to distribute post-pro-

cedure medications and instructions. Eleven students were recognized for their excellent Clinic Bag artwork and messages. They each received a drawing pad and colored pencils for their efforts.

Special speakers, Lynn and Kevin Bain, owners of the K9 Foundation (located in Aberdeen), presented a very interesting and lively demonstration of how dogs are trained. They included their own dogs Sledge and

Taz in the demonstration. The Bains train dogs for obedience, fun, agility, nose work detection, security, tracking and sports. Ms. Bain is also a certified veterinary technician (CVT). She spoke to the students about her career as a CVT and stressed the importance of being responsible pet owners.

To remind the students of their pledge to be kind, responsible advocates for animals, they all signed a poster that will remain in the 4th grade hallway.
